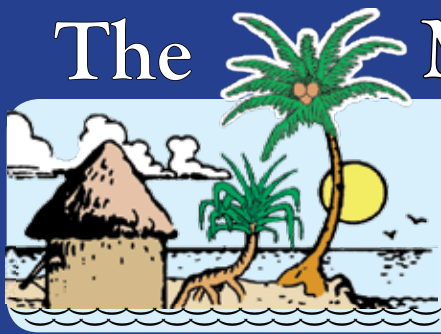

ICE ramps up focus on COFA

“The 25,000 Hawaii residents from countries of Micronesia, the Marshall Islands and Palau who are legally allowed to live and work in the U.S. are facing greater risk of removal if they have been arrested, charged with or convicted of certain crimes — even years after they have served their sentences in jails or prisons.”

This is the lead sentence in an article in the April 8 edition of the Honolulu Star-Advertiser.

A key point of this story is the statement that ICE is detaining non-citizens, including those from RMI and other Compact nations, who have not been charged with a crime.

“They (citizens of the three Compact nations) are among the larger population of non-citizens in Hawaii who are under the watchful eye of the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency,” the article reported.

Honolulu-based immigration lawyer Neri-bel Chardon told the Star-Advertiser that ICE is detaining non-citizens across the state who have been arrested but not charged with a crime. She said, though, it’s more prevalent for undocumented residents and beneficiaries of the federal Compacts of Free Association.

Prior to President Donald Trump’s second term, ICE was not focused on deporting convicted Compact of Free Association migrants or non-citizens who had already fulfilled their criminal sentences, said the newspaper article. “But priorities have changed,” it added.

In January, following Donald Trump’s inauguration, the Justice Department issued a memo to all law enforcement agencies to ramp up their focus on illegal immigration.

Jorbon resigns after 20 years

A long-time Marshall Islands Police Department Deputy Commissioner has resigned and issued harsh criticism of the Justice Minister in his resignation letter.

Deputy Commissioner Eric Jorbon, who has worked with MIPD for two decades, issued a resignation letter last Friday to Minister of Justice Wisely Zackhras.

In his letter to the minister, Jorbon said it was not his intention to leave MIPD. But, he said, “your text informing me to submit this resignation was all I needed to see that your trust and support for this Department is non-existent.”

Jorbon’s letter said his resignation was “effective immediately to comply with your request.”

In response to an inquiry from the Journal, Zackhras said he could not comment on Jorbon’s resignation.

“I cannot in good faith continue to battle the many lies that are given to the personnel of the MIPD and the continuous ways in which the RMI government has manipulated its promises to the hard-working personnel of the MIPD,” Jorbon said in his resignation letter to the minister. “I further cannot continue to try to work alongside a Minister who consistently walks away from the problems without trying to fight for the Department and the many needs it requires.”

MIPD has been advertising its top post for Police Commissioner in recent weeks. Minister Zackhras said the closing date to receive applications is this Friday, April 11. “Once we receive all applicants, we will screen and finalize with Cabinet,” he said, adding he hoped to do this soon “so we can announce.”

Criminal Investigation Division’s Caption Vincent Tani is acting in the top position at MIPD during this transition.

Donald Trump tariffs hurt RMI

The tariffs implemented against most nations of the world late last week by President Donald Trump upended US and global stock markets, costing investors trillions of dollars in losses — a nose dive that is also negatively affecting multiple trust funds and investments by Marshall Islands entities in the US stock and bond market.

Although there was some confusion as to whether the US was imposing a tariff on the RMI, any funds invested internationally by the Marshall Islands government, local governments, and government-related agencies have already suffered big losses because Trump initiated tariffs on a global scale.

And, more broadly, with US

companies facing higher costs to import goods from countries being hit with these new tariffs and Chinese companies facing rising costs from the imposition of tariffs on their exports, the collateral impact on the Marshall Islands can be expected since the RMI gets a large percentage of its total imports from the US and China.

The base tariff rate of 10 per-

cent implemented by the US government appears to include the Marshall Islands and other Compact nations, although the US Embassy in Majuro told the Journal that the Compact exempts the RMI from the tariff policy. “The bottom line is that the Compact of Free Association exempts the Republic of the Marshall Islands

Nitijela focuses on US tariffs

While the leaders of our nation were devising ways this week in Parliament to counter the Trump Administration on the recently imposed 10 percent tariffs, a closer-to-home sinister tornado of a targeted deportation scheme aimed at citizens of the RMI, FSM and Palau was brewing in Hawaii.

Hawaii is home to an estimated 25,000 COFA (Compact of Free Association) residents from the Federated States of Micronesia, Palau and the Marshall Islands.

A story this week in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser marks the first time US federal officials, immigration lawyers and journalists detail in public that ICE agents are deliberately targeting COFA residents by identifying those who had served their sentences years or decades in the past.

Honolulu-based immigration lawyer Neribel Chardon told the Star-Advertiser that ICE is detaining non-citizens across the state who have been arrested but not charged with crime, said the report.

Despite being COFA migrants, they are still not naturalized citizens and “any criminal activity committed by a non-citizen, regardless of when it is committed, is a violation of US Immigration law and places the individual at

risk of removal,” said ICE in a statement.

The above news paints a stark reality Micronesians are facing in Hawaii today: Past convictions are pathways to deportations and the Marshall Islands should expect a storm of deportations. Meanwhile, in Parliament last week and this week, President Hilda Heine and her Cabinet are proposing the use of a “demarche” against the US Embassy in Majuro concerning the US imposition of a 10 percent tariff (tax) on anything exported by the RMI to the US. A “demarche” is action to protest a government’s policy or actions.

This would be the second time the Heine administration resorted to this extreme political tactic with the nation’s closest foreign ally and largest financial beneficiary.

On action to address the increasing number of Marshallese being deported from the US, Riem Simon and a few good men and women have recently acquired government recognition for the establishment of the non-profit Marshall Islands Halfway House organization.

The need to create a transition system for incoming deportees to the community has always been a huge gap for the community and has been repeatedly tabled at both

the national level and local government of Majuro without much action. The Halfway House is being created to close this gap and provide humane services for involuntary returnees from the US, Riem told the Journal.

Riem was joined by Ebon Parliament Member Marie Davis Milne, a top advocate for those being deported and human rights, along with Biram Stege, Cecelia Takiah and Junior Bay, all of whom hold official titles in the new non-profit corporation.

In related Nitijela news, during Q&A sessions earlier this week, Parliament members continually:

- Sought updates from the

Cabinet on mental health funding that used to be provided to RMI through the US Health and Human Services Department through its locally-based Single State Agency. Misuse of funds, which violated US grant rules, forced the RMI government last year to repay \$1.3 million to the Health and Human Services Department. Nitijela members wanted updates on the status of the grants that were cut off by the US several years ago.

- Requested greater transparency on what took place and the aftermath of the recent drug bust inside the Marshall Islands Police Department jail in Majuro.

“Everyone is now focused on immigration,” said ICE spokesperson Richard Beam. “The world is just different now.”

He indicated a parking ticket or a minor traffic infraction would not necessarily be enough to lead to an immigration investigation for COFA migrants.

But immigration attorney Chardon warned that these minor violations could pose a greater risk for COFA migrants who already have a criminal history. She told the Star-Advertiser that DUIs (driving under the influence) or traffic infractions could work as “the door” that leads to ICE looking into one’s immigration and criminal statuses.

from the tariff policy,” said the embassy in an email provided to the Journal.

Trump’s executive order, in the section titled “Reciprocal Tariff Policy,” states in part: “The additional ad valorem duty on all imports from all trading partners shall start at 10 percent.”

Trump’s new executive order implements a 10 percent tariff across the board on virtually all countries in the world, with nearly 60 nations subject to higher tariffs ranging from 15 percent to 50 percent, with China being hit with a tariff of 104 percent.

According to multiple

sources, including Forbes, 10 percent is being levied on the RMI and other Compact nations. As the RMI, FSM and Palau export few products to the US, the 10 percent import tax won’t have a large economic impact in the islands, but could impact handicraft, aquarium aquaculture ex-

ports and other businesses that export products to the US.

The biggest impact of the tariffs in the few days since they were announced is in US and global stock markets, which have upended the global economy and undermined investor confidence, causing stocks to

drop close to 20 percent on average with a loss of close to \$6 trillion.

“Everyone is getting hammered,” commented a member of one of the four US nuclear test-affected atolls, all of which maintain trust funds that are invested in the US stock market. The Marshall Islands Social Security Administration, the College of the Marshall Islands, NTA and other local entities also all have investments in US stocks and bonds that have lost significant value as a result of Trump’s imposition of tariffs.

A bigger concern for local residents is how the tariffs will impact prices of imported goods, particularly imported food.

Suppliers in the US who source products from other countries will be paying higher prices to import those goods and will pass those higher costs onto the consumer. Mexico and Canada, for example, provide a large percentage of

fruits and vegetables eaten in the US and US grocery suppliers are the major source of fresh produce for RMI stores.

“Many of us here in Ebeye are worried about the recent 10 percent increase in tariffs on RMI from the Trump administration,” commented Ebeye resident Horgan Korok in a social media post.

“Should we be worried? I am witnessing anxiety in the business community about whether our shipping line will raise costs for container shipping, handling charges, and other fees. This could mean higher prices from local businesses, and that would impact us as consumers. We’re also anxious about what this means for the energy sector. Will MEC and KAJUR raise their rates because of this tariff hike? People here are already feeling the pinch, as many believe the prices of food and essential items are excessively high.”

New super machine lurking in the wings

Most of Majuro's residents are now very familiar with the spectacle of the long-armed excavator otherwise known as The Exterminator. In fact, it's truly hard to walk past the constant dismantling of the capital building without pausing for at least a few minutes to see if you will witness a large crashing down of heavy matter — ba-ba-boom.

And ... we have news! The Exterminator is soon to be joined by another super-machine: Yes, The Pulverizer is coming to the capital.

"The excavator, sorry, The Exterminator, was brought in specially for the capital building project," Pacific International Inc's Kenneth Kramer said Tuesday. "But we have another piece of equipment that was brought in as well. It's an item that is for breaking out the rebar from the concrete. It's called a concrete pulverizer."

"We've been waiting to bring it in to the project area until more stuff has come

down so it can start breaking out the rebar."

Kenneth believes this will be happen in the middle of next week, but that timing decision will likely be made by the onsite project manager Jacob Kramer.

Like The Exterminator, The Pulverizer will be operated by Joseph Mika, who has worked on a number of giant PII projects. "Joseph is the most skilled excavator in Majuro, no, make that the Marshall Islands," Kenneth

said. "He's the same operator who did all the shoreline protection work at the Jenrok track and field. And he did the work done at the water reservoir."

"At the track field, every single rock you see on the shoreline was placed one by one by Joseph."

The talented machine operator could be described as a gentle giant: "He's a big guy. Over six foot tall. But he's very, very quiet. You have to convince him to

talk. He'll come to work, go sit in the cab and he's happy until it's time to knock off or go have lunch. But you can totally see his skill as he works."

And what's going to happen with all the concrete and metal rubble and smashed glass once it is hauled away? "That will be up to the government," Kenneth said, inferring that it will presumably be used for fill on a project of their choice.

Winds, rain create outages

The day after power went out island-wide on April 3, the Marshalls Energy Company issued a press release to explain what happened.

The release said the unplanned power outage resulted from several issues caused by strong southerly winds and a heavy downpour.

"The problems began at 6:03pm when Feeder 1 (power plant to Laura) went down after coconut branches came in contact with power lines in the PII dock area and tree branches touched the lines near the Protestant Church in Rairok," said MEC.

"The intense rain made working conditions difficult, and unfortunately, our town bucket truck broke down during the repair efforts, forcing our crews to wait for the other truck to arrive from Laura. This delay extended the outage on Feeder 1, which wasn't fully restored until 10:56 PM, nearly five hours later."

The initial outage for the power plant to Laura area caused a domino effect on the other two MEC feeders that provide power to downtown.

"Just three minutes after the initial outage, at 6:06pm, Feeder 2 also failed when a pole behind the ECC building caught fire, requiring our linemen to replace the insulator despite the heavy rainfall," said MEC. "The situation was further complicated by flying roofing tin that struck secondary power lines near Delap Elementary School. Power to the areas served by Feeder 2 was restored at 9:16pm."

At the same time Feeder 2 went down, Feeder 3 also tripped, "likely as a result of the Feeder 2 failure," said MEC. "The continuing downpour presented challenges, but fortunately, our crews were able to restore power to the Feeder 3 area much more quickly, with electricity returning by 6:47pm, just 41 minutes after the outage began." Feeder 3 supplies Majuro hospital, the ICC and other government facilities from the power plant to this segment of Delap.

Driving and drains

The Urban Drainage Works (URP) Project has now reached two kilometers (1.2 miles) of completed drainage cleaning and improvement.

"As of today (Tuesday), our team is actively working downtown through Uliga Village," said Chris Bing whose company is handling the work. "We ask all drivers and pedestrians to please be patient, stay

alert, and watch for our workers and open drains. Safety remains our top priority, and your awareness helps keep everyone safe."

A lot of partners are involved in the ongoing drain improvement project, including the World Bank, which is funding the work, and the Ministry of Works, Infrastructure and Utilities, Ministry of

Finance and its Division of International Development Assistance, Marshalls Energy Company, Majuro Water and Sewer Company, National Telecommunications Authority, National Police, and Majuro Atoll Local Government.

Bing also thanked local churches, business owners, and Majuro landowners for their continued support.

throughout the island while heavy equipment is moving around and boulders are being transported.

"The CSOs (child safety officers) are strategically placed along the oceanside to prevent children from entering the work sites," Community Liaison Officer Junior Harry told the Journal. "Our shuttle bus makes frequent rounds around the island to ensure our CSOs are hydrated and are in good morale. Our hired cooks also provide healthy meals throughout the day to keep our guys fed and healthy." The World Bank awarded

Hall Pacific \$44 million to build a massive 1.8-mile seawall covering the entire oceanside of Ebeye. The coastal protection system will also feature pedestrian walking areas and multiple ramps for easy access.

Despite just arriving on Ebeye on January this year, Hall is slated to complete the coastal protection system by December of this year, according to Regional Manager Matthew Brown. By completion of the project, over 65,000 tons of transported boulders would have been in place.

The project aligns with the RMI Prep Two initiative.

Sea mining an ‘economic folly’



Experts call deep-sea mining a hunt for “fool’s gold” as the United States reportedly considers circumventing the international body that issues mining permits.

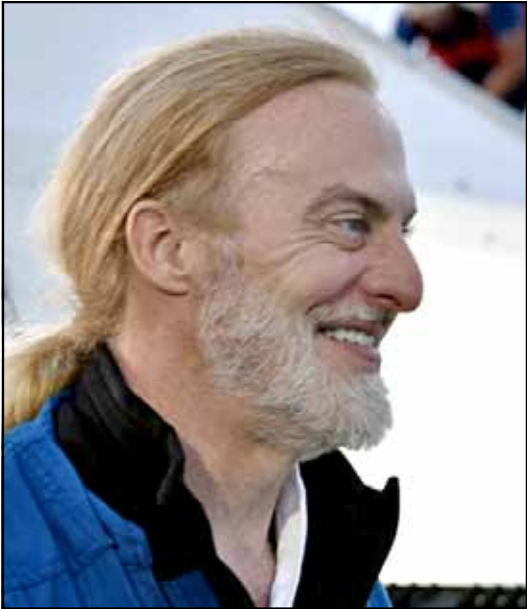
In a statement issued this week, the Washington, DC area organization Burness issued a statement saying that an executive order under consideration by the Trump Administration to open up the deep sea to mining would be economic folly and flout international consensus.

Burness is an organization that focuses on agriculture science and development, ocean health and protection, and sustainability in every day life.

The US government is reportedly considering an Executive Order that would issue permits to companies to mine the deep sea in international waters, circumventing the International Seabed Authority (ISA), the body that regulates mining activities on the high seas.

“This is a search for fool’s gold,” said Dr. Douglas McCauley, a professor at UC Santa Barbara and adjunct professor at UC Berkeley. “Market prices for minerals and metals sought from the deep sea have sharply declined in recent years, driven by global oversupplies from conventional mining and battery innovations. This could be the most expensive cobalt and nickel that has ever been mined on the planet.

“These trends are in part driven by reduced demand from the electric vehicle market, which has become increasingly

lem that existed 10 years ago.

“It Deep-sea mining is extremely challenging technically, highly destructive, not meaningful to worldwide production, and a very expensive, financially-risky solution to a battery metals problem that existed ten years ago – just to prove it doesn’t work.”

“The Metals Company is promising regulatory certainty

in a regulatory vacuum,” said Bobbi-Jo Dobush, ocean conservation policy expert and author of Deep Sea Mining Isn’t Worth the Risk. “The only certainty is that seabed mining remains an untested, wildly expensive way to get minerals we have already innovated away from.”

Burness, in its release, said:

- Unilateral US action would likely trigger a “fool’s gold” rush to mine the deep sea from competitors such as Russia and China, causing irreparable harm to vulnerable marine ecosystems and ocean health.

- The release of toxic materials associated with mining represents a risk to public health globally through seafood contamination.

- Deep-sea mining poses immense risks to marine habitats and ocean biodiversity.

reliant on new types of batteries such as the LFP batteries used in many Tesla models that do not require difficult to obtain, expensive metals. New innovation in ultra-fast charging stations designed for these new batteries, such as BYD’s recent announcement of charging stations that can add 400km of range in just five minutes, may further secure the dominance of these batteries that do not require metals from the ocean. Another challenge may be reluctance on the part of the US to land this material in US ports given the newly discovered radioactivity of these minerals.”

“Unilateral mining of the deep sea, which is the common heritage of human-

kind, would be a fundamental breach of the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea, which for over 40 years has provided stability in ocean governance,” said Duncan Currie, international legal expert and policy advisor for the Deep Sea Conservation Coalition. “Every country and every person would suffer the consequences.”

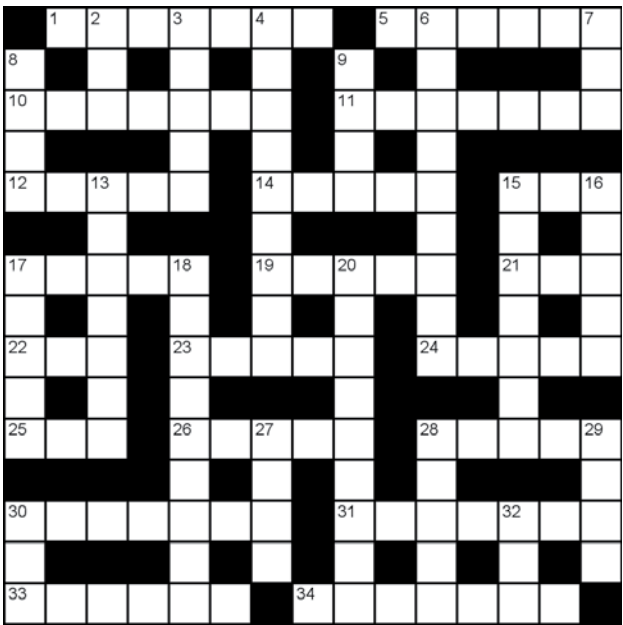

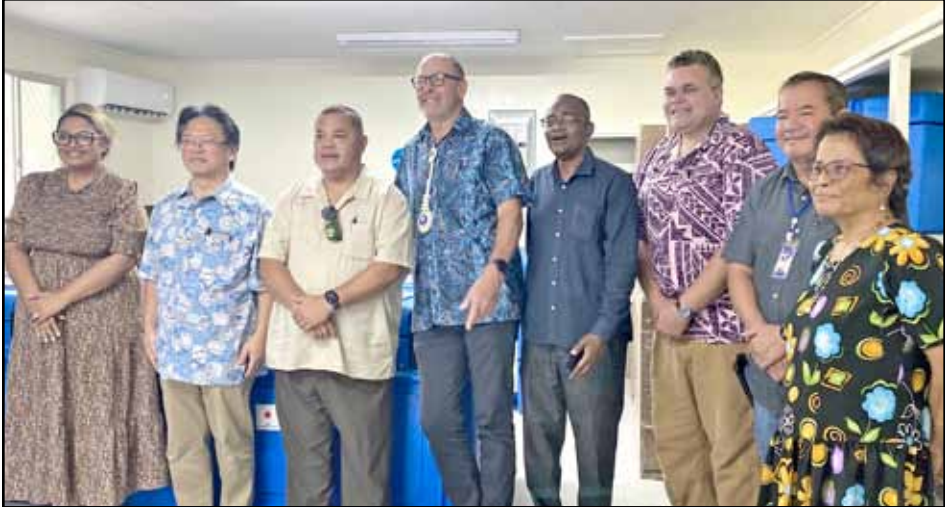

Japan, UNICEF donation to help on immunization

The Marshall Islands immunization program received a boost from a joint Japan and UNICEF donation of equipment last week.

Japan Ambassador Hirohisa Soma handed over cold chain equipment to the Ministry of Health and Human Services.

He was joined at the ceremony by Health Minister Ota Kisino, Health Secretary Francyne Wase-Jacklick, UNICEF Representative for the Pacific Island Countries Jonathan Veitch, MNCH/Immunization Specialist Dr. Abba Zakari Umar, and hospital staff.

The equipment handed over is part of Japan’s assistance through its Project for Strengthening Immunization Programs in Pacific Island Countries in collaboration with UNICEF. This project aims to reduce immunity gaps for children by improving the cold chain system to cover the outer islands in the RMI. The equipment and facilities handed over last week are essential tools to improve cold chain. This includes solar freezers, temperature monitoring devices, cold boxes and vaccine carriers.

At the ceremony, Ambassador Soma reaffirmed Japan’s commitment to developing resilient health systems for the Universal Health Coverage, as announced with Pacific Islands Forum countries at the 10th Pacific Islands Leaders’ Meeting (PALM10) in July last year. He also noted that these facility upgrades would strengthen the healthcare system of the RMI and benefit the Marshallese people together with the other contributions made by the program, such as two pick-up trucks hand-

ed over last December.

UNICEF Representative Jonathan Veitch noted “UNICEF is deeply grateful to the government and people of Japan for their generous funding support for the cold store extension and cold chain equipment, ensuring that safe vaccination reaches the communities that need it most, leaving no child behind.”

Minister Ota Kisino praised the government of Japan and UNICEF for their contribution to the expansion of cold chain facilities and said “today marks a significant milestone of the nation’s ongoing efforts to strengthen the healthcare infrastructure and to expand access to the life-saving immunization service across the islands.”

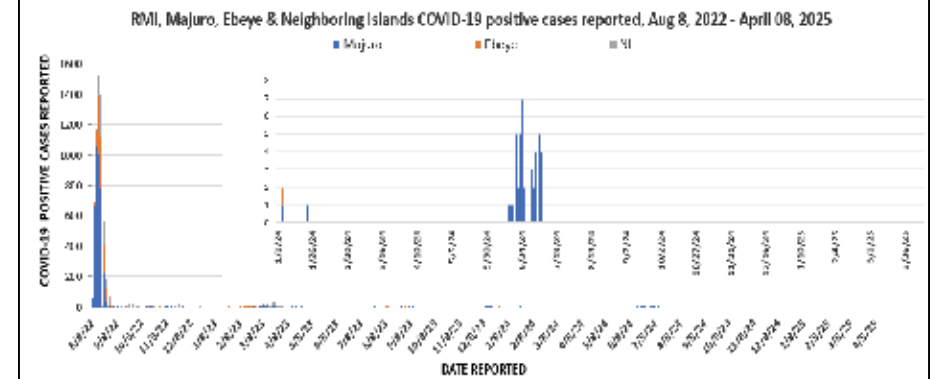

Trump’s racist, corrupt agenda

US President Donald Trump and his team is pursuing a white man’s racist agenda that is corrupt at its core. Trump’s advisor Elon Musk, who often seems to be the actual president, is handing his companies multiple contracts as his team takes over or takes down multiple government departments and agencies.

Trump wants to be the “king” of America and is already floating the idea of a third term, an action that would be an obvious violation of the US constitution he swore to uphold but is doing his best to violate and destroy.

Every time we hear the Trump team spouting a “return to America’s golden age,” they are talking about 60-80 years ago, when white people ruled and schools, hospitals, restrooms and entire neighborhoods were segregated and African Americans and other minority groups had little opportunity. Every photo of leaders from that time features large numbers of white American men. Trump’s cabinet, in contrast to recent cabinets of Democratic presidents, is mainly white and male.

This is where the US going. And lest any white women feel they are included in the Trump train, think again. Anything to do with women’s empowerment — including whites — is being scrubbed off the agenda by Trump minions in multiple government departments and agencies. “Women” along with things like “climate change,” “diversity,” “equality,” “gender equity,” “justice,” etc are being removed from US government websites, policies and grant funding.

The white racist campaign against people of color has seen iconic Americans removed from government websites. For example, a photo and story about Jackie Robinson, a military veteran, was recently removed from the Defense Department website as part of the Trump team’s war on diversity, equity and inclusion. Robinson was not only a military veteran, he was the first African American to break the white’s-only color barrier in Major League Baseball and went on to be elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame for his stellar performance with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

How about the removal of reference to the Army’s 442nd infantry regiment from World War II that is the most decorated unit in US military history? The 442nd was a fighting unit comprised of nearly all second-generation

But these messages painted by MIHS students are very much in keeping with Marshallese society and customary practices of welcoming visitors, inclusiveness and good treatment of women in this matriarchal society. But don’t let President Trump know Marshallese think like this.

American soldiers of Japanese ancestry who more than proved their courage and loyalty to the United States during World War II.

The Defense Department removing references to these iconic Americans is an outrage. But showing the moronic level of the Trump team, they also deleted a photo of the plane that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan at the end of World War II because the pilot named it after his mother, “Enola Gay.” Despite the significance of the Enola Gay airplane in American military history, that latter word couldn’t get past the Pentagon’s scrubbing team, who were determined to wash away anything that hinted at, well, anything other than white, heterosexual male. And there is plenty more that was wiped off the history record of the Defense Department.

Meanwhile, Trump, his team and the Republican Party in general while claiming to be focused on eliminating corruption is authorizing it on a grand scale. Elon Musk’s redirection of contracts to Starlink, SpaceX and other companies he owns is one example among many. What is happening in the American government today is like a bank robbery in broad daylight.

The Trump team fired a score of inspectors general — the very officials who actively work to prevent fraud and theft in the US government. They are eliminating or effectively neutering every enforcement agency, from EPA (which ensures clean air and other anti-pollution programs) and consumer protection to the National Labor Relations Board, where the mega companies like Musk’s, Facebook, Google and others have pending complaints from employees seeking a fair review of their work issues.

Trump with the aid of the Republican-controlled Congress is going to make huge cuts to Medicaid and Social Security — which will affect Marshallese living in America as much as Americans — all in order to

fund tax cuts for the richest Americans and big corporations.

Then there is Trump’s targeting of judges who rule against his illegal and unconstitutional initiatives — Trump criticism that is parroted by Fox News and other Trump minions, and is leading to things like efforts in the Congress to possibly impeach judges or restrict their legal jurisdiction. These are all anti-democracy, anti-US constitution actions that are already undermining the rule of law in the US. And we haven’t yet mentioned Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and its sweeping deportations without due process that is having calamitous collateral damage for people swept up in these deportation raids. ICE is deporting people legally in the US studying at US universities for writing articles or speaking about justice for Palestinians. Whether we like what the writer or speaker says, a fundamental principle of democracy in the US is that freedom of expression is protected by the US constitution. That is no longer the case for Trump and his Republican team, which is happily abandoning the rule of law, due process and everything else that makes America what it is.

The irony is that multiple countries, normally American allies, have in recent weeks issued travel advisories to their citizens about traveling to the United States in the present environment where anyone who isn’t white and doesn’t fit into a male or female designation is subject to potential detention and deportation. The immigration chill from the US will no doubt reduce visitor flow resulting in big losses in revenue, possibly in the billions of dollars, for tourism-related businesses.

Marshallese need to pay attention to what’s happening and have valid passports at the ready. Sadly, if Marshallese have any sort of conviction no matter how ancient or minor it is likely they will be targets for deportation. Further, even the visa-free access privilege for Marshallese and other Micronesians is apparently now under scrutiny by US authorities based on a statement by US Ambassador Laura Stone the Journal published in last week’s edition.

It is a difficult time be one of the closest allies of the US because the RMI must engage at many levels with a US government that is presently in turmoil.

Mass protests against Trump

Thousands of protesters in about 1,200 demonstrations gathered in Washington, DC, and across the US on Saturday. They formed the largest single day of protest against President Donald Trump and his billionaire ally Elon Musk since they launched a rapid-fire effort to overhaul government and expand presidential authority. People streamed onto the expanse of grass surrounding the Washington Monument with organizers saying more than 20,000 people were expected to attend a rally at the National Mall. Protester Terry Klein, a retired biomedical scientist from New Jersey said “our whole country is under attack, all of our institutions, all the things that make America what it is.”



Ukraine’s incursions

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has publicly acknowledged for the first time that his troops are active in Russia’s Belgorod region. “We continue to carry out active operations in the border areas on enemy territory, and that is absolutely just — war must return to where it came from,” he said Monday. His comments also referred to Russia’s Kursk region, where Ukraine still holds a small area after a major offensive last year. Zelensky said “the main objective” was to protect Ukraine’s Sumy and Kharkiv border regions, and to “ease the pressure” on other parts of the vast front line.

Time for ‘time out’

Donald Trump supporter and billionaire Bill Ackman said the president is losing the confidence of business leaders and should pause his trade war, which could cause an economic collapse while damaging his supporters the most. “The president has an opportunity to call a 90-day time out,” Ackman said in a post on X, to resolve trade issues via negotiation. “If, on the other hand ... we launch economic nuclear war on every country in the world, business investment will grind to a halt, consumers will close their wallets and pocket books, and we will severely damage our reputation with the rest of the world that will take years and potentially decades to rehabilitate.”



Famine likely in Gaza Strip

It’s been a month since Israel cut off humanitarian supplies to the Gaza Strip and without that much-needed aid, the living situation of two million civilians has rapidly deteriorated. In the past few weeks, Israel’s renewed bombing campaign has claimed hundreds of lives and displaced more than 280,000 people, according to UN officials. Without access to food, fuel and clean water, hunger in Gaza is worsening and could lead to famine. The UN and other aid groups have accused Israel of violating international law by blocking the flow of aid into Gaza. On Sunday, Israel said it would continue to pressure Hamas into releasing more hostages and would impose new conditions on the ceasefire agreement.



Sea lions dying

Sea lions have been washing up dead or sick on Southern California’s coastline due to contact with a toxic algal bloom, often referred to as red tide. Although the toxin is naturally present in the Pacific Ocean, human-caused climate change and land development has been feeding the outsized blooms. When the neurological toxin gets in the sea lions’ food supply, it causes them to suffer from a condition that causes seizures, difficulty breathing and aggressive or scared behavior. The illness has already led the poisoned animals to attack several humans in the water.

Kanlaon erupts

A restive Philippine volcano briefly erupted Tuesday on a central island, sending a 2.4-mile plume of ash and debris into the sky and forcing authorities to suspend school classes in four villages due to ashfall, officials said. There were no reports of injuries or damage from Mount Kanlaon’s latest eruption after dawn that lasted more than an hour and scattered ash in at least four farming villages southwest of the volcano on Negros island, the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology said. Kanlaon last erupted in December, prompting the evacuation of thousands of villagers, many of whom remained in emergency shelters on Tuesday as the volcano continued showing signs of restiveness, the Office of Civil Defense said.

What are the implications of our growing population? If the “no-change” situation occurs, it could mean that Majuro by the year 2025 has a population of 85,800. The low projection assumes there will be a faster decline in fertility and a slow decline in mortality, which would mean the RMI could have a population of 66,800.

However, in some ways, Carl Heine was more than a man — he was a piece of Marshall Islands history. Carl played a pivotal role in numerous political structures: the Congress of Micronesia, the Political Status Commission, the Marshall Islands Constitutional Convention, the first to the eighth Nitijela, and as an ambassador to the United Nations and the People's Republic of China. He was also the first, and so far only, published Marshallese with his book, "Micronesia at the Crossroads."

EPA’s fresh water update

In Majuro, EPA testing last month showed that Rairok Elementary School’s drinking water station was safe for use, as was the reverse osmosis unit at CMI Arrak. The Ministry of Health and Human Services dialysis UV and dialysis source both showed safe. In addition, five locations within Pan Pacific Foods were tested by EPA and all were safe. All of these locations showed zero E.coli (human or animal waste) and no total coliform.

Tap dancing in Ebeye town

During a visit to Ebeye last month, RMI EPA officials tested the water supplies for numerous government and businesses. It was a pretty mixed bag of results, with 11 of the 19 locations tested showing unsafe water. Several locations where EPA tested two different water sources for one business or government agency showed opposite results. For example, MISCo restaurant tap tested safe while MISCo restaurant container tested unsafe. Triple J butchering tested safe while Triple J food court tested unsafe. Some of the Public School System buildings at Ebeye Elementary compound tested safe and others unsafe. Kwajalein Atoll High School’s “K-tap” tested safe and its drinking tap tested unsafe. Most significantly, Ebeye public tap — the location that is fed reverse osmosis produced fresh drinking water by KAJUR, Ebeye’s power company — tested safe as did MIMRA’s ice making place and the National Disaster Management Organization office’s tap. Meanwhile, Marshall Islands Resort hotel tested unsafe. Those that tested unsafe were given instructions for cleaning their water sources and will be retested this month.

Most places safe for swimming

A majority of coastal locations in Majuro Atoll tested with clean water. Only four of the 17 locations tested by the RMI EPA during March showed “unsafe” for swimming or fishing. Those included lagoon by Rita Elementary and Marshall Islands High School, the Jenrok track and Delap Park. Otherwise, lagoon locations from Alwal Rita to Rairok Elementary School and across the lagoon from Ejit to En-eko tested safe.
